Children's Choir Music for the Feast of Tabernacles:

Dear Parents,

Preparations are being made to have a children's choir for our children aged 5 to 12 at each of our U.S. Feast sites this fall. (Some English-speaking international sites may be able to do so as well.) This year the children will again be singing two pieces of music. The first is titled "My Favorite Hymns," and the second is "I Sing for Joy." Both are approved by headquarters.

In order to make the process of obtaining a rehearsal recording and lyrics as easy as possible, MP3 rehearsal tracks and PDF copies of the songs are available to all who would like to participate.

[Please check with Greg Sargent if you have trouble downloading this material and producing a practice recording.]

The music is posted on the Feast website; but due to copyright issues, it is password-protected. To get to the page and download rehearsal tracks and lyrics sheets, click here ([Children 2019](#)) or go to the Feast web page ([feast.cogwa.org](#)) and look for the top navigation bar link along the top that says "Children's Choir." Enter the password "**FOTmusic2019**" when asked. Please note that the password is case-sensitive, so be sure to type it exactly as given here (without the quotation marks). Once you have logged into the children's choir music page, right-click on each of the files and choose "Save link as ..." or "Save target as ..." to download the MP3 rehearsal tracks and the PDFs of the music. You will need to do this for each of the files.

We have permission from the composer to post these files and allow members who will attend the Feast with us to download and use them. However, we do not have permission to forward them to friends or repost them elsewhere. We ask that you only share the password with others planning to attend one of our COGWA Feast sites. Your help in respecting the copyright and royalty rights of the composers is greatly appreciated.
